在外语的工具性需求— 学习、工作和生活方面, 没有高职生和本科生的差异。 高职生的自我认知更切合实际。










Fact 2






After some silence Jeff's grandfather calmly said, "Jeff, one day you'll understand that it's harder to be kind than clever."
- His Grandfather's words taught Jeff a great lesson and they became his life motto. Years later, Jeff Bezos became the CEO of Amazon, and he told this story to the graduates of Princeton University in 2010. He went on to say, "What I want to talk to you about today is the difference between gifts and choices. Cleverness is a gift, kindness is a choice. Gifts are easy—they're given after all. Choices can be hard. You can seduce yourself with your gifts if you're not careful, and if you do, it'll probably be to the detriment of your choices."
