SAMPLE

- Since most scientists agree that personality is shaped both by heredity and by social surroundings, it is obvious that culture plays quite an important role in shaping one's personality. Different cultures value different personality traits, so we tend to behave in a certain way because that is what is expected and accepted by a certain culture. In China, children are usually not allowed to interrupt while adults are chatting or discussing something. Similarly, subordinates will be frowned upon if they voice their opinions without being invited when their authorities are speaking. This culture might make the Chinese reluctant to share their opinions at meetings with foreign friends. However, people from the same culture do not necessarily behave in exactly the same way. We should not forget that some personality traits are inherited.
- Personality traits associated with Chinese culture: hard-working, honest, well-organized, careful, intelligent, determined, realistic, conservative, sensitive, friendly, generous, hospitable, courageous, patient, polite, modest, not very outgoing...

SCRIPT

SAMPLE

SAMPLE

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

SAMPLE

My viewpoint on the descriptions above is kind of complicated. On one hand, I think there is something in the descriptions of the personality traits according to one's birth year. If you compare those people born in the same animal year, you are bound to find some similarities in personality among them. It's reported that corporate use of pre-employment screening PTs has increased 300 percent in the last five years. Also about 30 percent of American companies use PTs to pre-select job applicants. It is an ef cient way of determining which applicants

are most qualified for a particular job. It can help employers make better judgment about an applicant's honesty, predict the likelihood that an applicant engages in certain conducts (e.g. theft, absenteeism) and forecast whether applicants are likely to engage in substance abuse or sexual harassment. And more importantly, PTs are supposed to help employers identify the traits that indicate whether applicants are suitable for a particular position. Besides, nowadays, there are so many job applicants, the use of PTs can help employers save a lot of time and money.

Against

It's ridiculous to use PTs to screen job applicants. As we all know, there is no standard or universally acceptable PT used by employers, so employers have used a variety of PTs. These PTs might not be valid or reliable at all. Also, one can learn how to skillfully answer the questions in PTs, which means the results of PTs are even less reliable. For example, for the first question in the sample PT: "I have never told a lie", a person who has not received any training might choose "Strongly Agree" or "Agree". But in fact, the "right" answer is "Disagree". Ironically, this will tell the employer that you're actually a very honest person for answering the question truthfully. Moreover, they only measure people's attitudes toward something in general, and people's attitude toward something in general cannot be used to predict how they react to certain business situations. Finally, PTs cannot predict people's behavior because behavior is context sensitive and people act differently in different situations.


