

Recently, China and Denmark have entered into a range of agreements to partner in areas including research, innovation and higher education. The purpose is to enhance the exchange of knowledge between the two countries. Against this background, more Chinese and Danish higher institutions are setting up an increasing number of exchange programs.

As a result of this, about 40 third-year students majoring in English, interpretation and translation, journalism, and Chinese literature from Beijing International Studies University (BISU) will study cross-cultural studies at the University of Copenhagen (UCPH) next year. 





### Teaching tips

Divide the class into groups of four or f ve. Ask Ss to discuss steps 1, 2 and 3 in class and design a poster after class. Before Ss' discussion, T can give the three college traditions mentioned in Step 1 to Ss as examples, and let them think of the following three questions.

**Faculty Commencement Line:** At the end of the commencement ceremony each year, faculty members form a two-sided receiving line through which the graduates pass. The faculty as a whole of ers its congratulations and best wishes to its newest alumni.

**Hoop Rolling Race:** Hoop Rolling began with an activity once held on May Day, which students celebrated as a day of escaping from real-world worries. One of the most popular was a race in which seniors, wearing graduation robes, rolled wooden hoops.

**Polar Bear Swim:** Dartmouth students celebrate Winter Carnival by jumping two-by-two into Occom Pond for the annual Polar Bear Swim. Safety remains a top priority: Each student is tied to a rope and uses a ladder to climb out of the water.

For example, the congratulations from faculty members will consolidate the sense of belonging in the graduates' mind, the Hoop Rolling Race will help seniors relieve their accumulated stress temporarily, and the Polar Bear Swim will encourage Ss to challenge what they thought was impossible to do.

#### TIPS

### Making your poster effective

- Determine how large your poster will be and how much space you have.
- Keep your title short and to the point so as to grab the attention of the viewers.
- Try not to present long and detailed sections of text. Bullet points can often be more effective and will maintain the viewers' interest.
- Keep it simple, clear and concise. Ensure that your font size is large enough to be clearly seen from at least a meter away.
- Try to use colors that are suitable for your theme.

## Step 4 Present your poster

Present your poster to the class. Improve it according to the feedback of your classmates. Then the class votes on the top five posters for the show.
